Earlier this year Pope Francis encouraged us to be hope for the future. He said to be that hope we needed two things.

Firstly, we needed a memory: of our people, our family and where we come from, the memory of our journey and what we received from those closest to you.

The Sisters of Saint Joseph are, for us, a pivotal part of that memory. This year the Sisters celebrate 150 years since they were founded by Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods. They celebrate 150 years of service to the community. Part of the Sisters' service has been the creation of ministries like Mary MacKillop International who today, in the most of concrete and human ways, bear witness to the love of Australia's first saint, Mary MacKillop in some of the poorest parts of the world.

the profound legacy left by so many in Australia whose gifts extend the hands and feet of Mary MacKillop.

Making an Impact ... Educating Timor-Leste

Some 20 years since the Sisters of St Joseph were invited to help the people of Timor-Leste in Tetun literacy, MMI's dedicated local staff work at the grassroots to empower whole communities by training teachers in the most remote and underserviced regions of the country. Through your support, 15% of teachers in Timor-Leste have been trained by MMI, providing the gift of life-long skills.

Dedicated teachers like Graziela
Fernandes, a recently trained year one
teacher from the remote muncipality of
Same, calmly explains to her students
that it is time to prepare their bodies for
reading. The children quiet down, cross
their arms, and put their hands in their laps.
Silence falls upon the room as Graziela

begins to read, though the silence does not last for long! Before, during and after the story, Graziela continuously asks children questions about the story's illustrations and narrative. She offers students the opportunity to share their personal opinions and whisks the book around the room so the students can have a closer look at the catchy illustrations.

By establishing classroom routines through songs and games taught by MMI, Graziela has been able to engage her students in classroom activities in productive, child-friendly ways. She expresses that the training has also helped her to implement parts of the new curriculum, such as establishing a classroom literacy corner, in order to build a culture of loving literacy and reading in her students.

Dear Friends

I was delighted when I was asked to accompany Kirsty and Sophie from MMI to Papua New Guinea last February. I had left the country after working with the people from 1970 to 1997.

Initially up in PNG I was part of a community of three Josephite sisters who opened and taught in Suain in a parish primary school. It was quite a remote area on the northern coast.

When school finished each afternoon we would work with the youth, the women and we would attend to any medical work that was needed.

There were also two other communities of Josephite sisters in PNG. Up in Vanimo, four Josephite sisters set up a primary school, a vocational school for girls and later established a Diocesan Pastoral Centre for the training of lay leaders.

The third community of Josephites was in Wasangela, in an isolated and remote bush area. The local people were extremely poor and yet they welcomed refugees from Irian Jaya.

As I look back on my life as a Josephite sister I always come back to the years I spent in PNG. Not only did I feel that the missionary work of enabling and forming others was a PNG. The return, for me, was like catching up with old friends and just so affirming of the work that so many Josephite women had done over 25 years. True many of the buildings and structures we set up were not there but the training and enabling of the women and men to be their own leaders and messengers of the Good News was still alive and strong.

It is with great joy that I welcome the congregation, through the work of Mary Mackillop International, reconnecting with this young nation and I am especially delighted that the area in which the Josephite sisters began working in 1966 is again going to see a Josephite presence. May the charism of Mary and Julian continue to grow in this isolated and poor area of the world.

Up to 60 women in Peru have been able to develop essential and productive skills in business, design, production, marketing, financial management, computing, conflict resolution and leadership. The women are able to use these skills to produce handmade Fair Trade products which are available for sale in Australia through MMI's Fair Trade organisation, Ethica Accessories. The women are paid a fair price for their products providing the ability to support their families not only with sustenance but building confidence and creating hope for their future.

School Peace Program

In Peru, students are learning skills in conflict resolution, peer mediation and advocacy, to help reduce bullying in their schools. In the last year, 88 teachers have also been trained in the program, allowing them to introduce violence prevention and conflict resolution strategies into their schools, helping them to be safer and encouraging a positive learning environment.

Changing Lives through friendship and faith

Education remains a key challenge for Timor-Leste's future development. In a country where nearly 50% of the population cannot read or write, the need to provide quality education is urgent.

The Knights of the Southern Cross in Victoria were inspired by the work of Mary MacKillop in Timor-Leste and made the 'leap of faith' to support the urgent need to develop and translate the Grade 5/6 Teachers Manuals. After an enormous yearlong effort and much dedication, groups and individuals across Victoria, Tasmania, WA and the ACT came together and raised almost \$30,000 for these vital resources. Bonifacio Da Costa Barreto (Bonnie), MMI's Health Literacy Co-ordinator visited from Timor-Leste. On 8th August The Knights of the Southern Cross invited Bonnie to
