### NILS4Vehicles: no-interest car loans help job seekers

To help people living on the margins find and keep jobs, we have expanded our Financial Inclusion Program in Central West NSW to offer interest-free vehicle loans. Like the No Interest Loans Scheme (NILS) for household items and services, NILS4Vehicles allows people on low incomes to borrow money without fees or interest to purchase a vehicle needed for employment.



Offered through our partnership with Good Shepherd Australia New Zealand, eligible recipients can receive a loan of between \$2,000 and \$5,000 to be paid off over a 48-month period. The loans are designed to give those on low incomes the opportunity to more easily purchase a vehicle required for employment or to help them get to

and from job interviews. Our staff help applicants to develop a budget and repayment plan to ensure the loan does not cause financial stress.

Thanks to your support, we also offer recipients access to our literacy programs so they can learn to better manage their finances and break the cycle of poverty.

#### Tetun storybooks bridging gap for Timorese children

Our Tetun Literacy and Teacher Training Project in Timor-Leste is improving educational outcomes for children in remote and rural areas and revitalising the native Tetun language. The project's storybooks, developed and written by local Mary MacKillop Today staff, are also spreading important messages of inclusion, gender equality, health and hygiene, environmental sustainability, and disability rights to young readers across the country.


Almost 30 years ago, the Sisters of St Joseph began providing literacy and teaching resources to support students to learn and write in Tetun, which was banned during the decades of Indonesian occupation.

Responding to a call for help from the Catholic Church, the Sisters created a library of Tetun language resources and developed workshops to train teachers to use them. Mary MacKillop Today continues this important work in rural communities across Timor-Leste. Local staff collaborate with the Timorese Ministry of Education to develop the Tetun curriculum, deliver training workshops for teachers and parents, and create classroom resources including illustrated storybooks in Tetun. Our aim is to strengthen the efforts of hard-working teachers to improve educational outcomes for students.

In July 2020, with kind and generous support from the family of the late Diana Petersen, we were proud to launch two Tetun storybooks that explore the rights, challenges and dignity of children living with disability. Developed for pre-school and primary school students, the books were created in consultation with the Ministry of Education, local disability organisations, not-forprofit organisations and other key stakeholders, all of whom provided input and feedback on the content. Children affected by disability were also involved, sharing their experiences about the stigma and challenges of living with disability.


The books have been approved by the Ministry of Education for use across all schools in Timor-Leste and so far have been distributed to teachers and parents through our education projects in Dili, Ermera, Manufahi and Liquiçá.

Agnes Brites Maia, Program Manager and author of one of the disability storybooks, said the hard work

undertaken to develop the books has ensured a great outcome for all involved.

"Our objective was to increase the knowledge of teachers, their students and also the community so they can understand that children with disability have a right to get access to education," she said.

"We have heard from disability organisations that they are very happy to see children with disability in the stories because it shows they have a right to participate."

Following the success of the disability storybooks, our team in Timor-Leste has been working on several more thematic children's books in consultation with the Ministry of Education and other stakeholders. Two additional titles focused on gender equality will be published and distributed in early 2022, and the team is in the early stages of developing content for more new titles about health and hygiene and environmental sustainability.

This project receives support from the Australian Government through the Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP).

#### Keeping children safe in Papua New Guinea

Thanks to your generosity, we were proud to work with our local partner in Papua New Guinea, Callan Services National Unit (Callan Services), to deliver a 'first-of-its-kind' workshop on child safeguarding for key decision-makers and executive managers from the National Department of Education (the Department).

Held over three days in October 2021, the workshop focused on raising awareness about the importance of effective



child protection measures in learning environments, as well as discussing ways to support the Department to develop policies and practices to The drafting of an agreement and eventually a Safeguarding policy will go a long way in addressing Safeguarding concerns in schools across the country, 29 – Ms Embe said.

better ensure the safety and wellbeing of children. With over 75% of children in PNG estimated to experience violence at home, increased awareness in this area is vital for the protection of children's rights and dignity. Positive outcomes from the workshop included the development of a new Working Committee endorsed by the Department and led in collaboration with Callan Services, to deliver effective Safeguarding policies and processes and create safe learning environments for children with disability. Alice Embe, Callan Services' Safeguarding Manager and workshop co-presenter, said the workshop was a "successful milestone" for both organisations.

### Meet Bridie, First Nations Scholarship recipient and Honours student

A proud Wiradjuri women and self-confessed science nerd, Bridie always wanted to go to university to become a scientist. However, growing up with a single mother and three brothers, she knew attending university would be tough. Indigenous students like Bridie often face significant challenges in accessing and completing tertiary studies.



A First Nations Scholarship from Mary MacKillop Today has enabled Bridie to graduate with a Bachelor Degree in Human Biology and Biomedical

Science. She is currently completing her Honours with the hope of pursuing post-graduate research in Indigenous health and genomics. Receiving a First Nations Scholarship has been crucial in her success.

"I got involved with the scholarship in 2017, when I started my bachelor degree. I was living off Centrelink, and it wasn't really enough to cover my rent. The financial assistance gave me the opportunity to live on campus and buy necessities like food. [Without it], I don't know how I would have supported myself. My mentor [through the scholarship] has also

helped me a lot. She's always been able to offer me really good advice.

### Your donations are helping vulnerable women upskill in Sydney

Thanks to generous support from people like you, each year we fund community initiatives across Australia that provide life-changing outcomes for adults and children impacted by marginalisation.

In 2020-21, we were delighted to support The Marmalade Foundation to run first aid training at Lou's Place, a daytime refuge in Sydney for women in crisis.

Aimed at marginalised women in the community, including women sleeping rough and those with mental health and addiction issues, the training program reached 16 participants in the first half of 2021. Lou's Place arranged for the two-day training program to be delivered by a certified St John's Ambulance trainer. Staff also requested the course be tailored to the needs of participants, with a focus on elements of first aid related to drug and alcohol use.

Staff reported that participants enjoyed the training and felt their new skills would be helpful for them and those around them.

For one participant, Sarah\*, the training provided the chance to learn important first aid skills that have helped to strengthen her application



to have her children returned to her care. After completing the training, Sarah said that the content was engaging, informative and up-to-date and that she would recommend the course to other women.

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### With your support, the Sisters are reaching those most in need in Peru

In Peru, we are proud to work with the Sisters of St Joseph to improve quality of life for children and adults living in some of the most remote parts of the country. We spoke with two Sisters about their experiences working on the margins in one of world's poorest and most underdeveloped countries.

Sister Charo Zurita is the Project Coordinator of our School Agricultural Project, which is teaching young students how to grow vegetables and raise small livestock. She divides her time between Macarí, located 4,000 metres above sea level in the Peruvian Andes, and San Juan del Oro, a district in the jungle. Both places are extremely remote and hard to access. Basic necessities such as fresh vegetables are hard to find and there are limited opportunities for work.

for these communities, fresh produce and protein for a healthy diet are not available. We realised however, it was possible to give children access to a healthy diet by teaching them about growing vegetables and farming at school, Sister Charo explained.

Thanks to your support, Sister Charo and our local partner, Fe y Alegría, have established vegetable gardens



at schools and homes, and taught students about caring for small livestock such as guinea pigs and chickens.

Now in its final year, Sister Charo says your support for the program has made a life-changing difference.

Eight years ago, Sister Clare Conaglen established the Mary MacKillop Hausi Centre in response to the urgent and everybody in the community. We have seen how it is possible – despite hardships - to help these communities have a healthy diet by growing their own vegetables and raising guinea pigs. Students, teachers and families are able to be more responsible with their own health. They have noticed a healthy diet adds benefits into their daily life.

unmet need for therapy services for children and youth with disability living on the outskirts of Lima. Today, the centre provides multidisciplinary therapy services, educational and social support to children and families who would otherwise have no access to services or may be excluded from the community.



With the support of Mary MacKillop Today, the Sisters of St Joseph have built dedicated therapy rooms on the grounds of the Parroquia (Parish Church) Nuestra Señora de La Paz in a marginalised, but fast growing community. With professional therapists providing subsidised one-on-one sessions, the centre has grown to support more than 90 children and



their families.

The pandemic has brought significant challenges for the centre, but also created the opportunity to engage more deeply with family members. Sister Clare says fundraising support from Mary MacKillop Today has been critical in ensuring the centre has remained open, particularly in this challenging time.
