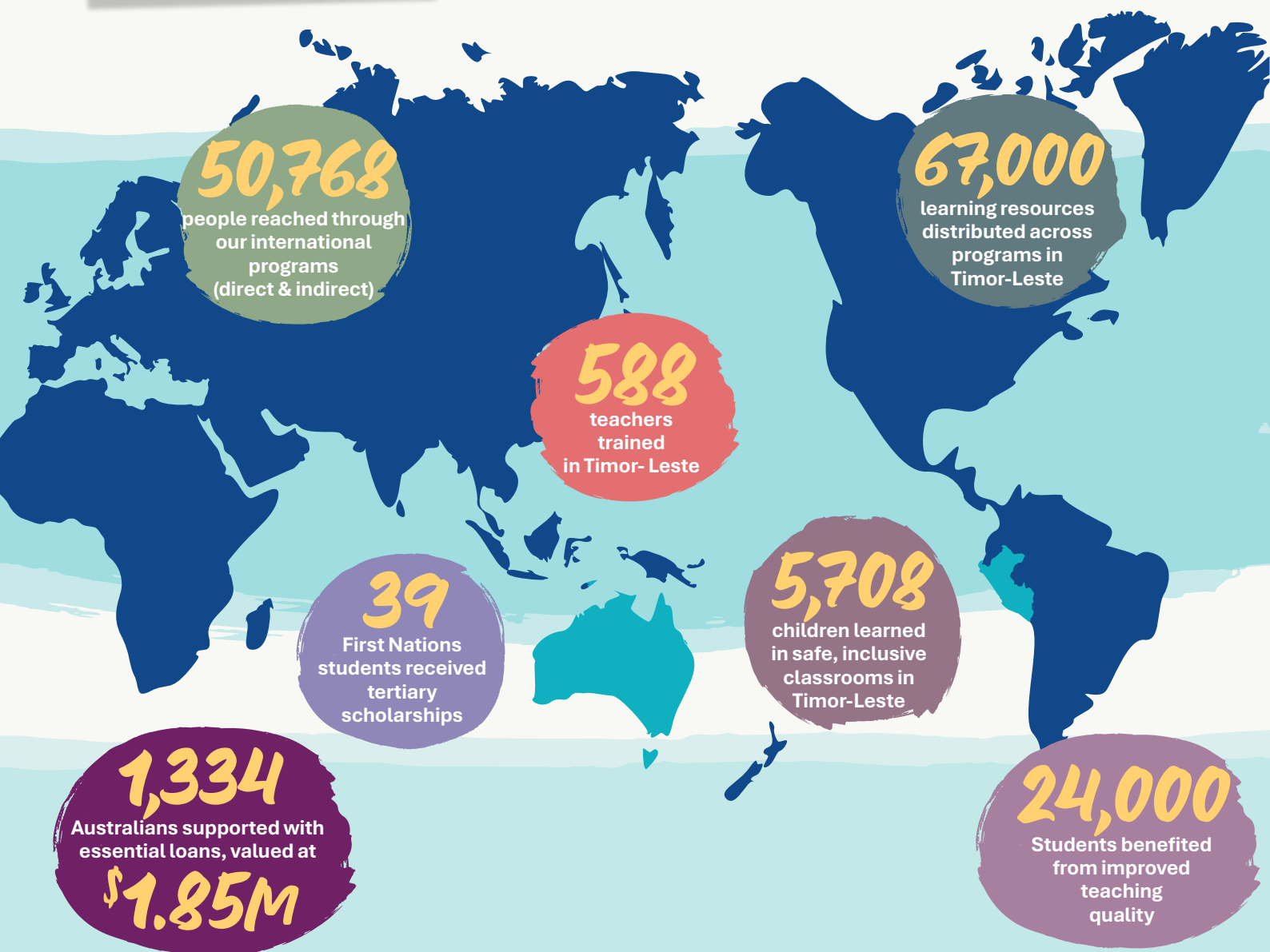

- In Fiji, our partnership with Ola Fou came to a close at the end of the financial year. We are pleased to continue working with the Psychological Survivors Association and to commence a three-year partnership agreement with BIRTH Fiji.
- Through these multi-year funding agreements, Mary MacKillop Today has been able to work closely with organisations that have the knowledge, strength, and resilience to create lasting change in their communities. We value partnering with these trusted organisations, who are leading change on the ground and enabling community-led development.

## PERU & FIJI

- In Peru, our partners transformed women's agency, including creating changes in family dynamics, empowering students, and strengthening connections between families and their Communities.
- In Fiji, our partners created sustainable income sources for people with a psychosocial disability and their families, while raising community knowledge and awareness on environmental sustainability, gender-based violence, positive parenting, and leadership.

### AUSTRALIAN PROGRAMS

The First Nations Tertiary Scholarship Program celebrated the graduation of 9 scholarship holders during this financial year. Among these students were graduates of Law, Medicine, Education (Primary), Sports and Exercise Science, Nutrition, Sports Management (Business) and Arts. Many of them completed a double degree.

## INCLUSIVE EARLY EDUCATION (TIMOR-LESTE)

*"When I grow up, I want to be a teacher..."*

Through mobile learning centres and teacher training, children like Juliana are gaining the confidence and skills to shape their futures.

Juliana is the youngest of five in a remote farming community in Timor-Leste. Her family often sacrifices food so she can attend school, knowing education is the key to breaking the cycle of poverty.

She loves being part of our Inclusive Early Education program. The mobile learning centre, a colourful bus filled with toys, books in Tetun, and creative activities, brings joyful learning to rural communities, supported by qualified educators. Behind the scenes, we train local teachers in inclusive, child-friendly methods and support families to nurture learning at home. For children like Juliana, this creates real hope and the chance to thrive.



# Stories of Change:

## EQUITY IN EDUCATION



### TEACHER TRAINING\* (TIMOR-LESTE)

Marcia, 22, teaches at a school in Manatuto, Timor-Leste. Far from her home in Baucau, she is passionate about helping children learn and grow.

Through Mary MacKillop Today's teacher training, Marcia gained practical skills in phonetics, numeracy, reading, and classroom engagement. She also learned to support children's social, emotional, cognitive, and communication development, understanding that every child learns at their own pace.

*"Before the training, I didn't know how to teach letters and sounds effectively or how to guide children respectfully."*

*Now, I can approach each child with patience and understanding,"* she says.

The results are already visible: children attend class eagerly, engage more confidently, and enjoy learning. For Marcia, the impact goes beyond academics. Education helps children develop values, skills, and confidence, creating a foundation for brighter futures.

Thanks to your generous support, teachers like Marcia are equipped to inspire the next generation. Your support is transforming classrooms, strengthening skills, and opening doors to brighter futures for thousands of students in Timor-Leste.

### HEALTH LITERACY\* (TIMOR-LESTE)

Through Mary MacKillop Today's Health Literacy program, teachers in Timor-Leste are equipping students with essential knowledge about nutrition, hygiene, and disease prevention. At schools in Manatuto, teachers received training aligned with the Ministry of Education's curriculum, covering topics such as malaria, dengue fever, diarrhoea, and overall healthy living.

This training has enabled teachers to turn theory into practice, teaching students how to wash hands properly, maintain hygiene, and understand nutrition for a balanced diet.

Small grants provided through the program also allowed schools to establish proper sanitation facilities, replacing outdated toilets and improving health conditions for students and staff alike.

Thanks to this support, schools are safer, healthier, and better equipped to give children the foundation they need to thrive.

### STUDENT LEADERS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL CITIZENSHIP (PERU)

In Ventanilla, Peru, students at Fe y Alegría are learning to become active citizens through the Fe y Alegría-led Student Leaders for Environmental Citizenship program, supported by Mary MacKillop Today.

The program helps young people to identify local challenges and lead initiatives that benefit their communities.

This year, students focused on promoting healthy eating after learning that many of their peers had low haemoglobin levels. Through a recipe contest using native Peruvian ingredients, students developed their culinary skills while raising awareness about nutrition and balanced diets.

Alongside their teachers, they organised and coordinated activities, building leadership, teamwork, and confidence in speaking up for their community.

By participating in this program, students are not only improving health and wellbeing in their schools but also developing essential skills for active, engaged citizenship.

### YOUTH ENTREPRENEURSHIP (PERU)

In Coalaque, a small district in southern Peru, high school students face limited economic opportunities despite rich agricultural resources. Together, a group of students identified a local challenge: excess limes produced by farmers were often wasted, sometimes even burned, causing environmental and economic loss.

With guidance from CEOP Ilo and support from Mary MacKillop Today, students developed an entrepreneurship project to produce lime jam. They learned innovative tools such as Lean Canvas and Design Thinking to plan, prototype, and refine their product. Tested at school fairs and in the local

community, the lime jam received positive feedback and created opportunities for economic growth.

Through this project, students built leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving skills, while contributing to sustainable livelihoods in their community.

## EQUITY IN EDUCATION

### EDTECH FOR EARLY LEARNING (TIMOR-LESTE)

In Maubara, Liquica, preschool children are discovering a new and engaging ways of learning through the EdTech for Early Learning Project, implemented by Mary MacKillop Today.

This initiative is transforming early education by helping teachers and parents use interactive technology that brings lessons to life while reflecting Timorese culture, language, and identity.

During a recent visit, team members Cameron and Charlotte met with Project Coordinator Enio and Project Officer Maia, observing classrooms using a new early learning app designed to complement the Ministry of Education curriculum. Filled with Tetun language activities including songs, designs, and creative activities, the app helps children see their own culture reflected in what they learn each day.

Children were highly engaged, confidently moving between traditional lessons and digital activities. Teachers like Fernanda have seen clear improvements in participation and enthusiasm: “The children are happier and more engaged. They play an active role in their learning, and parents are very happy to support them at home.”

Parents Maiana and Berta shared that their children are now recognising letters, numbers, and correct pronunciation, and that the app is strengthening learning at home as well as cultural pride.

“Before, we thought education was only the teacher’s job. Now we understand parents must also be involved.”

The project is also attracting interest from neighbouring schools, creating a ripple effect that boosts early literacy,

builds confidence, and deepens pride in Timorese identity.

Thanks to the generous support of the Noel and Carmel O’Brien Family Foundation, this innovative program is expanding across Timor-Leste, giving young learners a strong, culturally grounded start to their education.



### SUPPORTING VOLUNTEER TEACHERS FOR BRIGHTER BEGINNINGS (TIMOR-LESTE)

Mary MacKillop Today supported 24 volunteer community pre-school teachers across nine schools in Railaco, Timor-Leste, helping strengthen early learning for 327 children (171 girls and 156 boys). This year, teachers received literacy-focused training, along with mentoring, monitoring, and modest stipends to support their classroom work.

As part of long-term sustainability planning, the project is now transitioning to the Ministry

of Education. The Ministry will take on responsibility for teacher salaries and operational costs, while Mary MacKillop Today continues providing administrative support during the handover.

### PARENT TRAINING (TIMOR-LESTE)

Maria lives in Timor-Leste with her husband and two sons. Growing up, she never had the chance to go to school, as education for girls wasn’t considered important and schools were far from her home.

*“People used to say that for girls, education didn’t matter, that we would end up in the kitchen,” Maria said.*

Recently, Maria took part in a two-week parent training program run by Mary MacKillop Today, her first opportunity to learn in a classroom setting. The training helped parents build confidence and gain practical skills to support their children’s learning and wellbeing, from reading and writing together to understanding children’s rights, basic health, and positive communication.

*“This training is very important for me as a mother,” said Maria. “I learned how to pay attention to my children, to communicate well, respect their feelings, and support their learning. Before, I never had the chance to share my ideas.”*

Maria says her outlook and her daily life have changed completely.

*“Before, if my child didn’t have clean clothes, I would tell them to stay home from school. Now, I understand that was not right. Every morning, I prepare their breakfast, wash their clothes, and make sure they are ready for school. I read and sing with them at night, and I can now write the alphabet and count to one hundred,” she said proudly.*



Maria’s dreams have grown alongside her confidence.

*“My son wants to become a doctor, and another wants to be a police officer. I will support them so they can have a better future. Thank you to Mary MacKillop Today for giving us this opportunity to learn and to change our way of thinking.”*

### FIRST NATIONS TERTIARY SCHOLARSHIPS (AUSTRALIA)

This year, nine scholarship holders proudly graduated through the Mary MacKillop Today First Nations Tertiary Scholarship Program. Their achievements span a diverse range of disciplines, including Law, Medicine, Primary Education, Sports and Exercise Science, Nutrition, Sports Management (Business), and Arts, with many completing double degrees.

Each graduate’s success reflects the strength, resilience, and determination that education can unlock. These scholarships not only help students pursue their studies but also empower them to become leaders and role models within their communities.

As graduate Alissa, who completed a Bachelor of Criminal Justice/Bachelor

of Laws at Charles Sturt University, shared: “In the light of NAIDOC Week, I thought I’d also share that I have been nominated and am a finalist for the CSU Student of the Year Alumni Award for First Nations Excellence. Thanks for being on this journey with me and supporting me!”

Through this program, we continue Transforming Lives Together — Making Change Possible by supporting First Nations students to achieve their educational and professional goals, and to inspire the next generation.

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# Stories of Change:

## ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE/LIVELIHOODS

### VANILLA BEANS OF HOPE (TIMOR-LESTE)

In Railaco Leten Village, coffee farmer David began experimenting with vanilla cultivation, planting a few vines on his land. With guidance, training, and seedlings provided by Mary MacKillop Today, David learned essential skills such as pollination techniques, organic fertilisation, and crop care that enabled his vanilla crop to thrive.

Today, 250 of David's vanilla vines are bearing fruit, generating a significant income that has allowed him to invest in his family's future, including building a new home and covering his children's school fees. Beyond income, the project fosters sustainable agricultural practices, empowers local farmers, and

creates opportunities for economic independence in the community.

Thanks to the generosity of Mary MacKillop Today's supporters, initiatives like Vanilla Beans of Hope are transforming livelihoods, turning small-scale farming into lasting opportunities and helping families build resilience, stability, and hope for the future.

*Thanks also to Mary MacKillop Today and the donors who came to this village to help us with these things. We are grateful.*

### CU BEHAFU WOMEN'S LIVELIHOODS (TIMOR-LESTE)

In Sobrekek, Railaco Craic, Angelina has long worked on her family's farm, planting vegetables, cassava, taro, and coffee. With guidance from Mary MacKillop Today, she learned business and financial skills that inspired her to start a small home-based kiosk.

Through support from the CU BEHAFU Cooperative, Angelina secured microloans to grow her kiosk, pay school fees for her children, and make essential home repairs. Today, her kiosk provides daily income, improves access to food and household items, and gives her family a reliable source of support.

This project demonstrates how small-scale enterprise, training, and local partnerships can empower women, strengthen households, and build resilient communities.

### PATHWAYS TO ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE\* (FIJI)

After Tropical Cyclone Yasa devastated their home and livelihood, one family faced five years of hardship and uncertainty. Their farm was destroyed, income vanished, and the future seemed bleak.

Support from the Psychiatric Survivors Association (PSA), enabled by Mary MacKillop Today's donors, provided a \$3,500 grant that transformed their situation. The family invested in essential farming equipment and labour to revive their watermelon farm. With the first successful harvest, they expanded production, replanted additional crops, and created a sustainable source of income.

The impact extended beyond the family. Steady income improved living conditions, allowed for better food and stability, and created opportunities to support others in the community, including part-time employment for a family member in need.

### FINANCIAL INCLUSION: NO INTEREST LOANS (AUSTRALIA)

When financial challenges arise, access to fair and affordable credit can make all the difference. Through Mary MacKillop Today's No Interest Loans (NILS) program, people on low incomes can purchase essential items or vehicles without the burden of high-interest debt, helping them build financial stability and independence.

For one client, this support came with a special touch of care from Rochelle, one of Mary MacKillop Today's dedicated Financial Inclusion team members.

*"From the very beginning, Rochelle was attentive, thoughtful, and incredibly supportive. She answered all my questions with clarity and kindness and went out of her way to think outside the box to help me access the NILS vehicle loan."*

Rochelle took the time to understand her client's situation, reviewing every detail carefully and explaining the process in a way that was both professional and deeply compassionate.

*"What stood out most to me was how much she genuinely believed in me. Her confidence in my ability to manage the loan meant a lot, and it felt like she was really advocating on my behalf."*

Thanks to Rochelle's support, the client was approved for a NILS vehicle loan, opening up new opportunities for work, independence, and stability.

# Stories of Change:

## ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE/LIVELIHOODS

### FINANCIAL COUNSELLING (AUSTRALIA)

What if you had to choose between putting food on the table for your grandchildren or repairing a leaking roof threatening your family's health?

For Libby, a 63-year-old grandmother from rural Australia, that was her reality.

A lifelong carer in her local aged care home, Libby shares her small family home with her daughter, son, and three grandchildren. The house, over 80 years old, had been damaged by time and hardship. The roof leaked, mould spread across the walls, and the winter cold seeped in.

Rising electricity and groceries costs, along with the theft of her car, pushed Libby to breaking point.

*"I just felt completely helpless," Libby shared. "Everything just seemed to stand still."*

Across Australia, the cost-of-living crisis is pushing people to the edge, with three in five households struggling to afford basic necessities and rural families facing higher costs and limited services.

Libby turned to Mary MacKillop Today's Financial Counselling program, meeting Emma, a Financial Counsellor who guided her with care and compassion. Emma helped Libby understand her finances, create a manageable plan, access energy rebates, and connect with a handyman to repair her roof.

*"Emma doesn't just look at my bills," Libby said. "She sees me as a person... It's like having a friend who truly cares."*

Today, Libby's home is safe

and warm, her bills are manageable, and her grandchildren are thriving.

Through our Financial Counselling program, Mary MacKillop Today helps families like Libby's regain stability, independence, and hope.

Together, we are **Transforming Lives — Making Change Possible** across Australia.



### FINANCIAL COUNSELLING (AUSTRALIA)

At 86, Margaret has always lived modestly, carefully managing her small household budget. But as the cost of living rose, even her careful planning wasn't enough.

Things worsened when her credit card provider offered a cash installment plan. The funds helped with short-term expenses, but repayments doubled her monthly bills. Living on a fixed pension, Margaret quickly fell behind, and the stress began to affect her health.

Thankfully, she reached out to Mary MacKillop Today and met Emma, one of our Financial Counsellors. Emma took the time to understand Margaret's situation and advocate on her behalf.

After contacting the credit card provider, she successfully negotiated to have the debt waived and the account closed.

With immense relief, Margaret cut up her card, freeing herself from the burden of debt.

*"I want to thank Emma and Mary MacKillop Today for all their support," she said. "I finally have peace of mind knowing I'm not being drained by debt I can't afford."*

Through our Financial Counselling program, Mary MacKillop Today is helping Australians like Margaret regain financial stability and confidence — one conversation at a time.

### ENHANCING WOMEN'S CIVIL PARTICIPATION\* (PERU)

In the remote district of Marcapata, Dorotea, a 38-year-old mother and carer, is helping lead change for women in her community through the Kusi Kawsay women's organisation.

With limited schooling and few opportunities, Dorotea once doubted her ability to influence local decisions. But through workshops delivered by Mary MacKillop Today's partner, CCAIJO, she gained new confidence and practical skills in leadership, communication, and self-esteem.

*"CCAIJO came to our district and taught us about self-esteem, leadership, and communication."*

*I feel more confident now — I no longer feel alone. I know we have rights and that together, we can make change."* — Dorotea, participant.

Today, Dorotea is an active voice for women's participation in her district. She dreams of helping Kusi Kawsay grow stronger, attracting more women and younger members to ensure their voices continue to be heard in community decision-making.

### COMMUNITY STRENGTHENING (FIJI)

From Awareness to Action in Tomuka

In the community of Tomuka, 32-year-old mother Arifa has seen her life and neighbourhood transformed through BIRTH Fiji's (Building Innate Resilience Through Hearts) community project, supported by Mary MacKillop Today.

Before the workshops began, awareness around environmental care, gender-based violence (GBV), and positive parenting was limited. *"We didn't know much about how to manage our waste properly, and we never really talked about violence at home,"* Arifa shared.

Through BIRTH workshops, community members learned practical ways to apply the 3R approach, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and are now taking active steps to keep their environment

clean. *"Now we reuse things at home, separate our waste, and talk to our children about keeping our surroundings clean,"* she said with pride.

The training also gave women vital knowledge about GBV support systems. *"Before, we didn't speak up. Now we know the helpline numbers, and we use them. Women here don't stay quiet anymore, we ask for help and help each other."*

Parenting sessions have helped strengthen family relationships too. *"I understand my child better, and I talk to them with more patience,"* Arifa said.

From cleaner streets to safer homes and stronger family bonds, the BIRTH project is helping families in Tomuka create lasting, community-led change.

# Stories of Change:

## ACTIVE CITIZENSHIP

### YAWARDANI JAN-GA (AUSTRALIA)

#### HORSES HELPING YOUNG PEOPLE HEAL AND GROW

For the past four years, Athena has been part of the Yawardani Janga program which is an Equine Assisted Learning initiative that uses horses to help young Aboriginal people strengthen their social and emotional wellbeing.

Since it began in 2019, Yawardani Jan-ga, which means 'good feeling from horses', has supported more than 2,000 young First Nations people. The program, developed and led by Aboriginal community members in partnership with Murdoch University and supported by Mary MacKillop Today, is providing a light at the end of the tunnel for young people navigating the challenges of adolescence.

By connecting with horses in a culturally grounded, trauma-informed way, participants like Athena are building confidence, self-awareness, and resilience, skills that will stay with them for life.

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, Yawardani Jan-ga continues to empower young Aboriginal people to heal, grow, and flourish.

### HIGHWAYS & BYWAYS COMMUNITY GRANTS (AUSTRALIA)

In June 2024, Okines Community House hosted its much-loved Winter Solstice Lantern Parade, celebrating community, culture, and conservation. This year's theme, *T Politus – Red Handfish*, highlighted the plight of the critically endangered Red Handfish — a unique species found only in Tasmania.

The event began with a Welcome to Country and storytelling by local Tasmanian Aboriginal Elders, who shared the deep cultural connections between land, sea, and community.

In the lead-up to the parade, Okines Community House ran two days of lantern-making workshops, giving hundreds of local schoolchildren the chance to learn about marine conservation and create lanterns inspired by the Red Handfish.

On the night, more than 600 people gathered to light up the streets in a vibrant celebration of community spirit and environmental care. Information displays about the Red Handfish helped raise awareness about local conservation efforts and the importance of protecting the fragile marine ecosystem.

One participant shared, *"Having recently moved to the area, I really enjoyed my first Okines Lantern Parade. The Welcome to Country and community spirit were amazing. I didn't know anything about the Red Handfish before, but I learned so much from the event."*

Through support from Mary MacKillop Today's Highways & Byways Community Grants program, Okines Community House brought people together to celebrate connection



to Country, environmental stewardship, and shared responsibility for protecting Tasmania's unique biodiversity for generations to come.

### COMMUNITY GRANTS (AUSTRALIA)

#### GIVING CHILDREN THE CHANCE TO FIND THEIR VOICE

Through the Cockburn Ear Health Program, supported by Mary MacKillop Today, Aboriginal children in and around Perth are receiving the specialised care they need to thrive. Since January 2025, the program has provided free ENT, Audiology and Speech Pathology sessions, helping to address hearing loss and communication challenges caused by ear health issues.

More than 100 children have already been supported by the Speech Pathology service in clinics, schools, homes, and day care centres. Families say the program has been life-

changing, giving their children the opportunity to communicate, learn, and grow with confidence.

*"The service has been wonderful. My grandson and granddaughter have come so far. Junior's speech has come along, and his understanding has grown in leaps and bounds. It's been great that the therapists can come to us because we are not always able to get to the clinic for sessions there."* — Grandparent of children supported through the Cockburn Ear Health Program.

Thanks to your support, Aboriginal children are gaining stronger voices, brighter futures, and the opportunity to reach their full potential.

### FREE2B GIRLS (AUSTRALIA)

Across rural Tasmania, Free2b Girls is creating a place where girls can truly belong. With locations in St Helens, Campbell Town, Longford, and Beaconsfield, the program offers a safe, welcoming space where participants feel valued, supported, and empowered.

For many girls, Free2b is more than an after-school program; it's a consistent space to connect, explore, and express themselves. Its non-judgmental environment fosters belonging, and some long-term participants are now mentoring others, sharing the guidance that helped them thrive.

Free2b empowers girls in rural and isolated communities through mentorship, activities, and community support, helping them build confidence, resilience, and leadership skills.

Support from Mary MacKillop Today and Highways and Byways enabled essential infrastructure and a paid staff member, strengthening the program's impact and ensuring more girls can flourish.

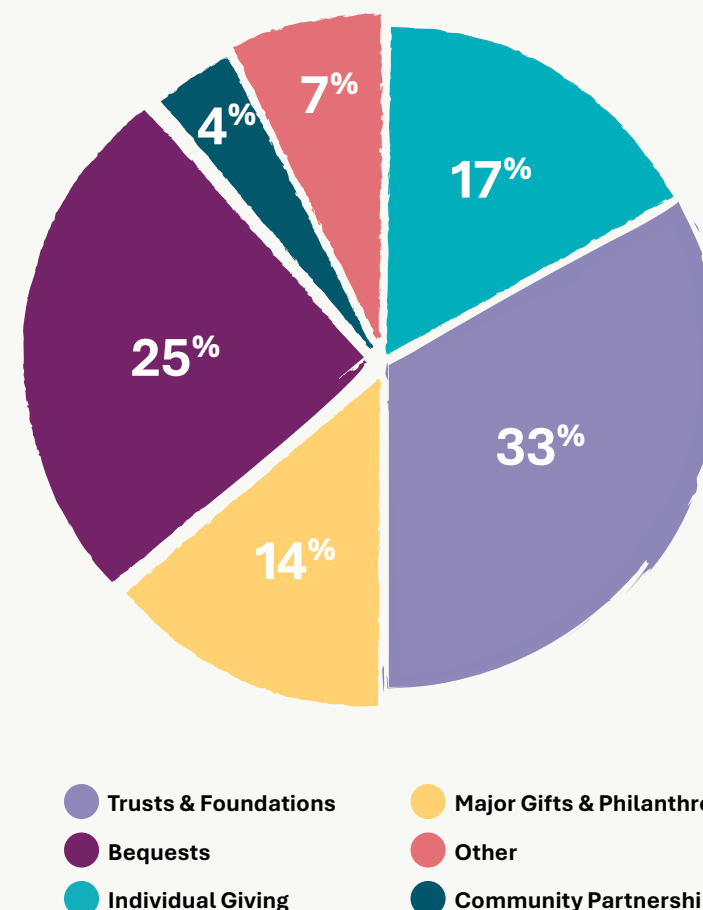

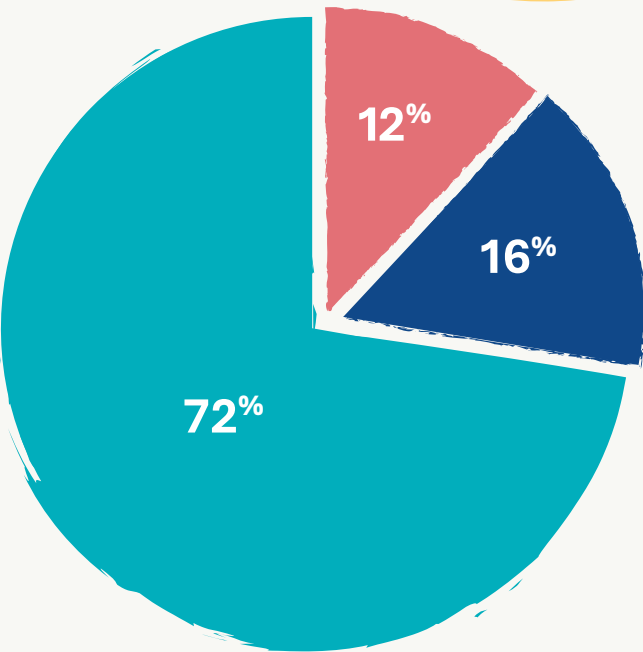
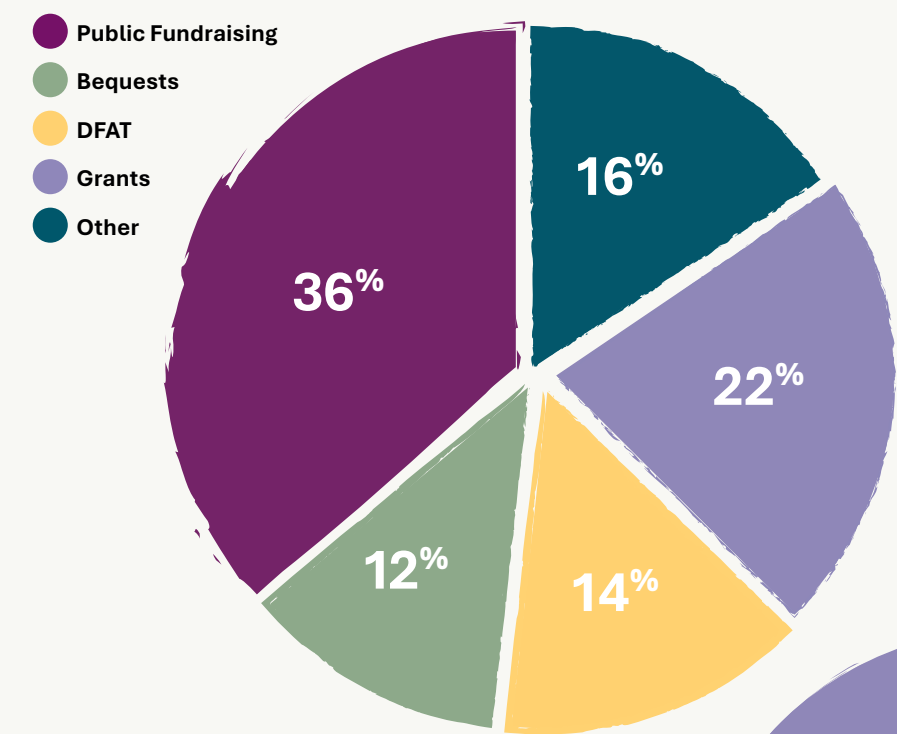

## REVENUE SOURCES TO 30 JUNE 2025

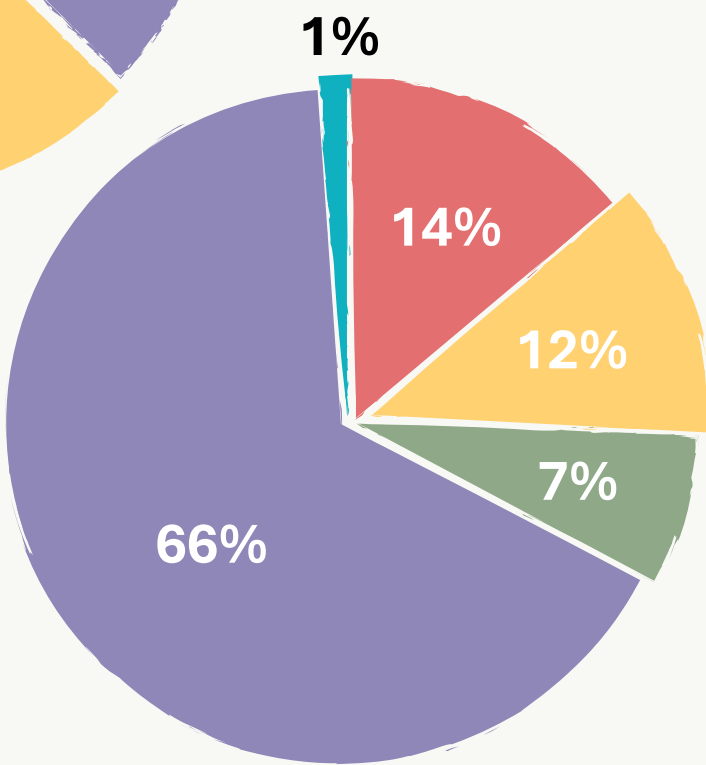
